Re: Update on the Royal Commission of Inquiry Into Abuse

Throughout this year the Royal Commission has continued its hearings and witness statements into abuse suffered in both State and faith-based care.

The Royal Commission has also been finalising its findings into redress for survivors and is due to release its final report this month. The Church and other stakeholders contributed submissions to the report which will likely provide recommendations on implementation of redress for survivors.

In early 2022, the Royal Commission will hold public hearings into the St John of God Brothers (in relation to Marylands, Christchurch) and survivor accounts of abuse in care of Māori.

Attached for your use is an information pack provided by Te Rōpū Tautoko with further details of the work of the Royal Commission and that of Te Rōpū Tautoko. It also includes information on the Church's Roadmap which sets out how the Church is working proactively to do what it can do now, rather than wait for the Royal Commission's final recommendations in 2023.
